The tour gardens at a national hosta convention are always the best. Each in its own special way reflect the interest of the gardeners. The 2018 convention (June 20 - 23) was in the northwest Philadelphia area. Thursday the leaf show was judged and then open to the public. Late afternoon and evening we were bused to the Longwood Gardens. If you are ever near Longwood, do take the time to visit. The historic Main Fountain Garden was revitalize in 2017 at a cost of nearly \$100 million (www.longwoodgardens.org).



The Friday and Saturday bus rides started early and were long, but gave us time to rest and talk. The convention was very special for my wife Lucy and I. We have four grown children in MI, NJ, VA, and GA. Two of our "kids" did the whole convention with us and


Back to the private gardens. They ranged in size from 1/3 acre city lot to 10 acres. We had attended the National in 2006 when it was



also at Valley Forge. Back then the Barbara and Robert Tiffany Garden (old mill property) was on tour so the plants were young, and they also had just experienced a flood. The garden has evolved and been redesigned to include about 1000 hostas, companion plants, and great structures. The Parsons' garden included a very large collection of garden art.

Check out the American Hosta Society publications to read about the tour gardens!

When I go on a national, regional, or state hosta tour I list ideas I might replicate in my garden, and now and then I will even implement an idea. Here are some garden ideas I noticed in PA that you might consider:



- Hardscapes Use similar or like materials, make a design statement with walks & stairs. Bed edging is a challenge.
- Structures for chickens, raised beds with hoops and netting, raised beds made from stacked flat flag stones, resting places, shade pergolas, and plant mini hostas in rock gardens or containers.

- Garden art Develop a theme, use industrial or farm equipment, and add sounds to the garden (water, chimes, bells, music).
- Hosta Label plants, map beds, name beds for special collections ("Blue Bed"), name and arrange beds by classification list ("II-3 Large Yellow"), mass plantings that look like tapestry, locate large eye catchers ('Liberty', 'Leading Lady', 'Sagae') at long views, and look for sports and wild seedlings.



 Companion Plants/Trees/Shrubs – Japanese maples look great in hosta beds, as do redbuds and magnolias, and bamboo spreads like wild fire. Check out Hydrangea serrata 'Blue Bird' too.

 Containers - Troughs/containers can be made of most anything, succulents work well with hostas, raise up and cluster containers.



 Deer Control – High deer fencing. Low fencing with a dog also works well.

Hosta Registration

In the coming weeks, the American Hosta Society (AHS) will be rolling out new changes to the Hosta Registry webpage (www.hostaregistrar.org) that you should hopefully find very helpful. The AHS has recognized the importance of consolidating information related to hosta and has teamed up with the Hosta Growers Association (www.hostagrowers.org) to provide a "one AHS Hosta Registrar. There are specific criteria and information that must be addressed in the application and once approved by the Registrar, the hosta becomes an official registered cultivar. However, not everyone registers their cultivars with the AHS. Hosta 'Wheee!', for example, is not a registered hosta. So, you will not find Hosta 'Wheee!' or other unregistered hosta on the Hosta Registry website.

Currently, the Hosta Registry website will tell you who registered the hosta; when they

stop shopping" type of website where you can find much more information about specific cultivars than ever before.

First of all, you need to understand what the Hosta Registry is and why it is so important to us as interested hosta growers. Before a hosta can be named and officially registered with the AHS, the originator of the cultivar must file a registration application with the

registered it; the size of a mature clump; the size, shape, color of a mature leaf, as well as the number of vein pairs; and information about the scape and the flower. This not the most glamorous type of information that most people would find useful, but it is invaluable when you need help identifying a specific hosta, or if you are a leaf judges who judges leaf shows.

For those nearly 6,000 hosta currently registered, the Hosta Registry website is about to become a very valuable tool for you to use. Soon you will be able to visit the website, type in the name of a cultivar you want to find out information about and begin to find out a lot more about it than ever before. In addition to all of the information listed above, you will now find pictures of many registered hosta; so if you want to see what a particular plant looks like, simply go to the official hosta registry webpage and take a look. The AHS has spent several years collecting and taking photographs of thousands of hosta that will be added to the registry website over time. So even if there isn't a picture of a plant you are looking for now, it may be added later when more information is added.



You will now be able to find the full Leaf Classification list on the Registry website. Leaf judges use the classification list to determine where a leaf entry in a leaf show is placed and this is based on a coded system that places the leaf by size, color, variegation, streaking, leaf size by length and width etc.

Having this information at the show judge's fingertips along with seeing a picture of the leaf if they are not familiar with it makes this a valuable resource to them.



Finally, the site will have the ability to list all of the hosta nurseries that are members of the Hosta Growers Association who carry the cultivar you are looking for along with updated price information. You will be able to click on a link taking you to that grower's website and order it directly from them. The Hosta Growers Association is paying for the upgrade to the Registrar's website so this is hopefully a win/win for the American Hosta Society, the Hosta Growers Association, and mostly for you, the consumer of this information. So start looking for the upgrade to the website soon and keep coming back to use it.

Please join us at 9:00 a.m. Sunday, August 19, 2018 at Hidden Lake Gardens in Tipton, Michigan (6214 Monroe Road Hwy, M-50, Tipton, MI 49287) for our annual workday at the Benedict Hosta Hillside. Following our



clean up of the Hillside, we will move to the big tent set up near the parking lot for our picnic luncheon (donations accepted). Following the picnic, we will have a short business meeting and then commence with our hosta auction. Our auction is a major source of funding for the Michigan Hosta Society. It would be greatly appreciated if everyone could bring plant donations for the auction.

We are not planning on mulching the Hillside during this workday. Weeds are abundant and many beds have hosta that need deadheading. We are going to try to prioritize beds that have the worst problems with weeds and deadheading and start with those beds first.

your Felco's, possibly a trowel in case a weed has deep roots, and anything else you might have that you use in your own beds to simplify the task. We should have 5-gallon buckets provided by Hidden Lake Gardens.

On another note, for the past several years, it has been a goal of the MHS to collect as many of Herb Benedict's hostas as possible. We would like to establish the largest



collection of Herb's hostas in the country if possible and display them in a collection in his hybridizer bed at the Hillside. We need

your help.
